## **UNIT 34: HARDANGER FOR YOUTH**

# Introduction and Guidelines

Hardanger Embroidery first began in the Hardanger region of Norway, where stitchwork artists took the Italian stitchwork "reticella" and translated it into *hardangersøm*.

In the beginning, hardangersøm was mainly used on apron borders and collars. But as more people used tablecloths and napkins, it became popular to decorate them with hardangersøm. As each area in Hardanger developed its own bunad (folk costumes of Norway), hardangersøm was used on some of the headdresses, breast cloths and hand covers (used to cover the hands in church). All young girls were expected to learn to do hardangersøm well enough to be able to embroider their own konfirmasjonsforkle (confirmation apron).

Today, hardangersøm is done by boys and girls alike and is very popular among Norwegians and Norwegian-Americans.

#### **Guidelines**

In order to fulfill the requirements for the youth level of this unit, you must complete the "To Do" starred activities and choose one activity from <u>Elective Activities</u> (see p. 2). You must also complete a Final Report on page 3 (forms are attached).

### Instructions

#### TO DO

If you have never done Hardanger embroidery before, we recommend that you get a book on basic Hardanger embroidery (see list on page 2).

**\*1.** To show that you know the following basic stiches, make a sampler that has the following stiches:

- Satin stitchWeavingWebs
- WeavingWebsPicotsSpokes
- PicotsEyelets
- Box-in stitch
- Cable stitch
- Adjoining wrap




• Buttonhole edge stitch

**\*2.** a.) Demonstrate these techniques in two to five simple items. It is not necessary to include all above stitches.

For example, make a doily, a placemat, a bookmark, Christmas ornaments.

b.)Take one or more photos of your items and submit the photos with your Final Report.





# **Elective Activities**

#### CHOOSE ONE

**\*1.** Write a short article about Hardanger embroidery. Submit it with your final report and offer it for publication in your lodge newsletter. Suggested length: 100–200 words.

**\*2.** Form or join a crafts club in your lodge or local community. Meet at least four times and work together on your crafts. Write a brief report and take pictures.

**\*3.** Find and interview a mentor in Hardanger embroidery—a relative or Sons of Norway lodge member who has been doing Hardanger embroidery for a long time. Prepare five to 10 questions for them about when/where/how/why they started and what kinds of things they've made. Take a picture of yourself with your mentor and write down their responses to your questions. Include the mentor responses with your Final Report.

**\*4.** Read magazines, books or articles that will help you become better at Hardangersøm. If possible, visit a needlework store selling Hardanger supplies or a craft fair. Write a report on what you've learned. Suggested length: one page.
