Tug-of-War

The tug-of-war is a great way to involve the community and give your lodge local media attention. It should carry a challenge— i.e. Norwegians vs. Swedes, lodge vs. other community group, politician vs. politician, etc. A letter should be sent to recruit tug-of-war participants as well as have team captains appoint team members. An entry form should be filled in by each participant, and a final letter should go out to all involved (see attached examples of above).

This should be a fun, often irreverent event. It should be surrounded by a party/carnival-like atmosphere. There should be loud boasts and elaborate warm-ups. Team members should arrive on the field heralded as mighty warriors—the whole affair presented as larger-than-life.

In the end, however, there must be a winner and a loser. The losers should gracefully submit the victory prize to the winners, and the winners should make the next challenge. A decree should be made up describing the monumental battle and honoring the combatants. Both decree and trophy should be on display in some appropriate viewing place for others to see and entice their involvement in the next tug-of-war challenge.

GENERAL RULES FOR TUG-OF-WAR

- A. Each team should be equally matched in numbers and weight.
- B. The teams should be eight feet apart at the center of the rope.
- C. Two lines should be drawn at the front of each team on the ground.
- D. A marker should be tied at the center of the rope. When this marker crosses a teams line, they have won.
- E. Winners must pull the marker over their line two out of three times.

A starter should begin each pull in a loud and fair manner. Each judge will then determine if the start was fair and that the marker had indeed crossed the line of the winners.

The awards presentation should be made right after the contest with a lot of pomp and ceremony. A press release could be issued covering the victors and losers. A final letter and decree should be issued soon after the event.

BASIC MATERIALS

- A. 150 feet of sturdy rope, not nylon cord
- B. T-shirts of different colors for team members
- C. Gloves for all participants (or ask that they bring their own)
- D. All participants should wear sturdy shoes or boots
- E. Three impartial judges
- F. Information fliers, letters, and maps to site
- G. Transportation of team members to site
- H. Cheerleaders
- I. Plenty of water for team members
- J. Trophy, or trophies

Dear Norwegian/Swedish Organization Officer,

Midsummer, A Minnesota Festival of Music, will host the premier international athletic competition—"The Swedish/Norwegian Tug-of-War." Under the skillful, and often cunning charge of Minnesota's former govenors Wendell Anderson and Albert Quie, the fearless Swedish and Norwegian teams will oppose each other in resolution of their centuries-old feud. The teams, strong and courageous representatives of their respective ethnic communities, will march to Hyland Lake Park Reserve's Festival Field at High Noon on Sunday, June 19, 1998. These determined men and women, empowered by their commitment to triumph, will engage every muscle and sinew in their pursuit to final victory. One team will win; the other will lose. Peace and tranquility will then finally return to the Festival Field.

Governors Quie and Anderson will have begun recruiting players for their 40-member teams. Twenty players will be chosen by each of the team captains, and the remaining 20 positions will be selected from the various Norwegian and Swedish organizations. We invite you and your organization to participate in "The Swedish/Norwegian Tug-of-War." Sponsorship of an organization representative will require submitting the enclosed application, a short description of your organization, and a reason why your chosen representative should be included. All recruits will be announced on WCCO's Boone and Erickson Show. The chosen players will receive a team uniform, instruction by the team captain, and the distinction of representing their ethnic community.

With more than 150 ethnic organizations represented in Minnesota, only 40 representatives will be chosen. We hope that your candidate will be selected. Please return the enclosed application by June 10, 1988.
